

The Twenty-Third Sunday after Pentecost

November 16, 2025

For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth; the former things shall not be remembered or come to mind...

The wolf and the lamb shall feed together, the lion shall eat straw like the ox...

They shall not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain, says the Lord. (Isaiah 65:17, 25)

This past week has been an eventful one at Trinity, a week that demonstrates this church's commitment to being a community that shares God's unconditional love, both within the parish and in the world. On Saturday morning, parishioner Roberto Rojas was ordained as a deacon of the Episcopal Church in a beautiful service at Trinity Cathedral in Trenton. Our church was well-represented, both among parishioners and clergy who came to support, and also Trinity alums like the Rev. Felipe Huamani (priest at All Saints, Lakewood), the Rev. Carolyn Bradley (deacon at Christ Church, Toms River), and the Rev. Rocco Sherman (deacon at St. Mary's, Point Pleasant Beach).

Later in the day, back here at Trinity, our Sanctuary Committee (co-chaired by Maria Tassiello, Mary Perez, and Gregory Curatolo, and supported by Director of Community Engagement and Organizing, Derek Bloom), hosted a "Know Your Rights" immigration forum, presented by the American Friends Service Committee, in partnership with the Consulate of Mexico, Interfaith RISE, Parker Family Health, Community Affairs and Resource Center, and our own Trinity Center for Community. In a difficult time, this was an important conversation and created many community connections.

Wrapping up Saturday, the Stewardship Committee, chaired by Wendy Jaghab, hosted a wonderful parish-wide potluck dinner. While adults gathered in the auditorium, Jill Osis led a program for children and youth, with a lesson on how they too can be stewards of their resources of time, talent, and treasure, followed by pizza and games. During the potluck feast, the adults discussed their core values and their vision for Trinity in 5, 10, and 20 years. Each table group then presented their vision to the whole room as we collectively created a starfield to represent our hopes and dreams. It was an amazing evening of fellowship and visioning.

On Sunday, we gathered for joyful and meaningful worship, and as part of the sermon time we watched the "I Believe" video in which parishioners of all ages spoke to their most deeply held values. The statements were beautiful and moving, and put together, it was an inspiring and powerful testimony to this congregation's deep faith in God and humanity.

The next day, Monday, Trinity put God's love into action through our first Code Blue night of the 2025-26 season. More than a month before the official start of winter, temperatures dropped below freezing, and when this happens we open up a warming center to make sure that no one who is without a home has to stay out in the cold and risk hypothermia. This mission of Code Blue is simple: to save lives. On the first night of the Code Blue season, we provided hospitality and refuge for 68 overnight guests

Every year 340 million tons of plastic is dumped into our environment. The U.S. contributes the largest share of any nation with 17-20% of this waste, even though we are only 4% of the world's population. This is 335 lbs. of plastic waste, per person, per year in this country. Worldwide only 9% of plastic is recycled, in the U.S. it's even less, at 5%.

Plastic waste is harmful in many ways:

- As a substance, it has the longest decomposing time frame- even more than metal or glass!
- Plastic is the #1 factor harming and diminishing our sea life.
- Plastic is highly energy intensive to produce, creating a large carbon footprint.
- Plastic has a base of limited fossil fuels
- Plastic in the air/water/food has been linked to human health concerns; respiratory, brain functioning and cancer.

As stewards of this earth, God has entrusted us to take care of it. You may say, but what can I, one person, really do to impact this problem?

On November 30th, after both the 8 and 10 services, the EARTH project will have a table at coffee hour. Available to you will be a list of recyclable and non recyclable plastics. Come learn more about increasing your personal plastic reuse and reducing your personal plastic waste. While learning about this, we challenge you to take the "Plastic Pledge". The Plastic Pledge is an action you can take each time you go grocery shopping. Each week when do your usual shopping, right before check out, challenge yourself to make one "non plastic" decision, this may be switching a shrink wrapped item for an item not in shirk wrapped, this may be buying something is a glass jar instead of a plastic jar, maybe it's entirely not getting the saran wrap and deciding to use Tupperware instead. There is strength in numbers, if all Trinty members took the pledge, we'd eliminate 18 tons of plastic in a year.....18 tons! Amen! So come by the EARTH table on Sunday November 30th after both services, learn more about plastics, take the pledge and help the EARTH.
